

Packaging and packaging waste consultation: EU national registers of producers

Update

New European Union (EU) rules on packaging and packaging waste (PPWR, Regulation [2025/40](#)) require each EU Member State to establish a national register of packaging producers to monitor compliance with Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) requirements. EPR aims to ensure that producers of products are financially and/or organisationally responsible for managing the waste stage of a product's life cycle.

The European Commission is now proposing rules on how Member States should establish these registers of packaging producers in their country.

Each individual Member State may also choose to include in their register non-EU producers of packaged products (including food), who will need to appoint an authorised representative for EPR to carry out these obligations on their behalf.

This proposal sets standardised formats for registration of packaging producers and for reporting, and specifies the information that must be submitted. This will ensure consistency across all EU countries.

Impacted products

Packaging, packaged food products

What is changing?

The PPWR (Regulation [2025/40](#)) introduces the Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) scheme, under which packaging producers are financially responsible for managing the waste stage of the packaging's life cycle, for example by organising or paying for the collection and disposal of waste.

National register of producers

Each EU Member State is required to establish a national register to monitor packaging producers' compliance with EPR requirements (PPWR, Art. 44(1)).

The European Commission is proposing to set standardised formats for registration and reporting in these registers, and for the data included.

Annex I of the draft proposal includes the formats for:

- registering a producer (Part A)
- declaring how the producer meets its EPR obligations (Part B)
- providing a certificate to be issued by the producer responsibility organisation (Part C)
- registering an authorised representative (Part D).

Annex II of the draft proposal lists the information to be submitted for reporting, depending on the volume and type of packaging entering the territory of the Member State each calendar year.

In the case of composite packaging and other multi-material packaging, information on the weight of each material contained in the packaging should be reported.

For packaging already accompanied by a digital product passport, that passport can be used to provide the necessary information to the register of producers.

The proposed formats accommodate those EU countries that have separate packaging waste management systems (e.g. for household, commercial, and industrial waste).

Reporting obligations in the Single Use Plastics Directive

In addition, the proposal integrates in the new register EPR reporting obligations set by the Single Use Plastics Directive [2019/904](#) (Art. 8). Producers of the following single-use plastic packaging must pay EPR fees (Directive [2019/904](#), Annex, Part E, Section I):

- food containers (e.g. boxes, with or without a cover), packets and wrappers containing food intended for immediate consumption without any further preparation
- beverage containers/bottles up to 3 litres, including caps and lids (but not glass or metal beverage containers with plastic caps and lids)
- cups for beverages, including covers and lids

- lightweight plastic carrier bags.

The proposed reporting formats allow for additional reporting, for example where individual EU Member States set additional national recycling targets.

Why?

By setting standardised formats for registration and reporting, the European Commission aims to reduce the administrative burden and avoid divergent national registration systems.

The PPWR sets new rules for packaging and packaged products put on the EU market, including the management of packaging waste. It has introduced the EPR scheme for packaging to make all packaging reusable or recyclable by 2030, and to reduce (over) packaging and packaging waste.

Timeline

The Regulation is expected to be published in the fourth quarter of 2026, and will enter into force 20 days after publication. From that date, EU Member States will have 18 months to establish a national register of producers.

What are the major implications for exporting countries?

EPR requirements may also apply to non-EU producers exporting packaging or packaged products to the EU.

EU countries can individually request non-EU producers of packaged products (including foods) to appoint an authorised representative for EPR, who will carry out the obligations related to the management of packaging and of packaging waste in that country on behalf of the non-EU producer (Art. 45). This is **not a general obligation**, but can be requested by an EU Member State when the non-EU producer makes packaging or packaged products available on their territory for the first time (even if is already on the market in other EU Member States).

Background

Packaging is one of the main users of virgin materials and is a significant contributor to waste. While the share of recycled packaging has been growing slowly in the EU between 2014 and 2023 ([European Commission 2025](#)), much recyclable packaging is still not recycled. This is because there are not enough suitable, economically viable collection and recycling processes.

The PPWR is part of the EU's circular economy action plan ([European Commission 2020](#)) which commits to making all packaging reusable or recyclable by 2030, and to reducing (over) packaging and packaging waste.
