Welcome to Issue 60 of AGRINFO UPDATE. We report on a new public consultation – an important opportunity for stakeholders to give their views on aspects of the organic rules that could be simplified. The European Commission has also proposed a simplification to the EU Deforestation Regulation; and discussions are under way on reducing the maximum residue levels (MRLs) for a number of pesticides. Recently published Regulations include the approval of four additional organic control bodies, and the authorisation of food additives.

Pesticide MRLs

EU discusses reducing maximum residue levels to the limit of determination, with particular impacts on products listed here:

- azocyclotin and cyhexatin apples, oranges, grapes
- <u>chlorfenapyr</u> tea
- <u>diazinon</u> cranberries, pineapples, radishes, kohlrabies, hops, spices, sugar beet roots, animal products
- <u>dicofol</u> melons, cotton seeds, teas, hops, poultry products
- <u>endosulfan</u> tea, soybeans, cotton seeds, spices
- <u>fenarimol</u> certain fruits and vegetables, and hops
- fenpropathrin citrus fruits, strawberries, melons, tea
- <u>profenofos</u> mangoes, tomatoes, cotton seeds, spices, animal products

New Regulations coming into force and application dates



Organic production

EU approves four additional organic control authorities/bodies. Applies from **25 October 2025**

Food additives

- EU approves combined use of <u>E 200 and E 202 in non-heat-treated plant-based mousses</u>. Applies from 4 November 2025
- EU extends approved use of <u>quillaia extract (E 999) to include</u> food supplements. Applies from 9 November 2025
