#### **Pesticide MRLs**

WTO SPS consultations – deadline 14 February 2025. EU proposes to:

- amend MRLs for metolachlor
- set MRLs for triflusulfuron to the LOD for all products
- lower MRLs for chlorpropham on potatoes
- reduce MRL for methoxyfenozide on aubergines

EU publishes new rules to prohibit sales on the EU market of products made with forced labour. Applies from **14 December 2027**
